GUIDELINES FOR REQUESTS TO USE THE COMMONWEALTH COAT OF ARMS IN EDUCATIONAL PUBLICATIONS

The Commonwealth Coat of Arms is the formal symbol of the Commonwealth of Australia that signifies Commonwealth authority and ownership.

The Commonwealth Coat of Arms is used by Australian Government departments and agencies, statutory and non-statutory authorities, the Parliament and Commonwealth courts and tribunals.

Publishers may seek permission to reproduce the 1908 and 1912 Arms in educational publications and media. The following guidelines apply:

- The text and illustrations accompanying the depiction of the Arms must be sighted by the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet before permission may be granted.
- The publisher is required to place the following words at the end of the text:

“Permission to reproduce the Commonwealth Coat of Arms granted by the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet”.
- No material should be placed above the Arms or near it in a way which diminishes its dignity.
- The Arms must not be produced on the cover or dust jacket of a book or shown in a way which might lead a reader to believe that the material is of Commonwealth origin or has Commonwealth endorsement.
- Requests will be considered on a case by case basis.
